#### **PASTOR'S PAGE**

"O Lord, how long shall I cry for help, and you will not hear? Or cry to you "Violence!" and you will not save? Why do you make me see iniquity, and why do you idly look at wrong? Destruction and violence are before me; strife and contention arise. So the law is paralyzed, and justice never goes forth. For the wicked surround the righteous; so justice goes forth perverted."

Many of you probably noted my absence at the end of July and beginning of August. I had the opportunity to take a trip that involved visiting some of my sons and seeing some of America in the process. We often see the rest of the country on the television. Now many see it on their smart phones. We form our impressions of what our nation and people are becoming based in part by these images. So, of course, depending on your sources of information, you will have your own opinions on the state of our world be it good or bad.

Some people believe that we live in the best of times. A very good argument can be made for this belief. Some people believe that things are very bad right now and quickly getting worse. There are arguments that certainly support this point of view. I formed some impressions that both support and undermine both of these views.

The good news is that I traveled across the country twice and visited what many (and statistics) would call the major cities of our nation safely and enjoyably. I heard no gunfire, saw no crime (even though graffiti is criminal it seldom rises to a level that could be called more than a nuisance) and found just about everyone helpful and polite. I used most forms of public transportation without fear. I walked in what some

would call questionable neighborhoods and wasn't accosted by anyone save for a few passive panhandlers. I looked the tourist and wasn't set upon. Those I encountered were friendly, perhaps not as much as Texans, but by big city standards, certainly so.

So, what's your point, Pastor? If everything seems good, if not great, what's the big deal?

I personally believe the closest Biblical parallel to our times are the times of the Judges of Israel. The refrain, "Everyone did what was right in his own eyes," occurs twice. And that was the direction of Israel. They had the moral law written into their hearts, as everyone does. In addition, they had the written law, which they were to "lay up these words of mine in your heart and in your soul, and you shall bind them as a sign on your hand, and they shall be as frontlets between your eyes. You shall teach them to your children, talking of them when you are sitting in your house, and when you are walking by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise. You shall write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates..." Deut. 11:18-20

I find the best descriptions for our time is, "Everyone does what is right in his own eyes." That could be the creed of the United States, if not the wider world. There is no indication that anyone seems bound by man's law, so what of God's law? And although this describes our society and even the world that we live in, things don't seem to be all that bad. YET.

Once again, we are being told that everything is riding on the upcoming election. That if the right (or wrong) people aren't elected; watch out. Once again doom and gloom on the one hand, roses and chocolates on the other. From

both sides the threat is that everything is on the verge of collapse, even the very foundation of our society.

I would be remiss if I agreed with either of these opinions. The experience of my recent trip for one. But things can and could get worse, a whole lot worse. They have been considerably worse, even in some of your lifetimes. Next year is the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the end of the Second World War. That was worse, but now the youngest veterans are in their 90s. Before that was the Great Depression. Again, you would have to be in your 90s to even remember that disaster. There are wars, fire and flood, natural and manmade disasters and these certainly will continue until the Lord returns, as He promised. (Both the continued strife and His glorious return.)

As God's people, we are privileged to know of a gracious and merciful God who deals with us, not according to our sin, but for the sake of the innocent suffering and death of His only begotten Son: Jesus Christ. For Jesus' sake, God has put away our sin and promises forgiveness, life and salvation. No trouble in this world can take away this assurance. This alone fills us with joy and peace. Peace that the world cannot give.

We, like Habakkuk, will continue to see strife, suffering and misery in this world. We are not promised that we will be spared the troubles of this world. On the contrary, God has prepared us just for this day. The problems of this world are His vehicle for showing the world its need for a Savior. They point the world away from manmade solutions and the arrogance of thinking that we can perfect this fallen world. The more men try to save themselves, the more they are bound to fail.

This leads me to believe things will indeed get worse. And history teaches me that they can get much worse. We think we have seen it all. But there is an old saying, "You haven't seen anything yet!" Perhaps things will get better. I'm not a prophet. Yet God's word points us to an end times where things definitely get worse across the whole world. "And you will hear of wars and rumors of wars. See that you are not alarmed, for this must take place, but the end is not yet. For nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom, and there will be famines and earthquakes in various places. All these are but

the beginning of the birth pains." Matthew 24:6-8

But, getting back to what I saw on my journey across America, I would have to say they aren't bad enough yet. The people I saw were comfortable with their situations. They felt secure in themselves. They, like the Israelites at many times during the period in their history of the Judges, haven't suffered to the point they are crying for relief. There doesn't seem to be the urgency to seek comfort in a time of trouble.

Most people don't feel threatened in their persons. They are not fearful for their children or grandchildren. And what is worse, many don't really care if things do get worse, because they are secure in themselves. "What is it to me if things do get worse," they might say. "I've got all I need and enough for the future," I'm not worried.

But is this really love for brother? Is this really how our hope in God is expressed in this world? Isn't this just another way of doing what is right in our own eyes? And what does the Scripture teach about this attitude, being right in our own eyes?

"The way of a fool is right in his own eyes, but a wise man listens to advice." Proverbs 12:15 "Every way of a man is right in his own eyes, but the Lord weighs the heart." Proverbs 21:2

We can certainly share our knowledge with the world. We can proclaim that God has promised a day of judgement for this world. That the standard is not what is right in our own eyes but what He has commanded. This may cause some to turn from us. They won't want to hear the condemnation of their sin. They might feel that we are self-righteous. But then, we have warned them.

And we can certainly share the reason for our hope. That we too are sinners before God who have been bought with the blood of Jesus. He is our hope and glory. He is the Rock upon which we stand and the place where they too find forgiveness and life. To Him be the glory forever and ever. Amen.
